

## Airspace changes

The CAA has expanded Class D airspace around London City and Luton Airports to provide more protection for commercial flights. The moves follow a consultation with groups like AOPA as well as local government and environmental bodies.


Although an option to increase the size of the London City Zone was considered by NATS, who sponsored the LCY airspace change, the proposal was modified to establish a new CTA following the consultation. The new area begins at 1,500 feet and ends at the base of the London TMA, 2,500 feet. Existing departure or arrival routes and procedures remain unchanged.

The change, which is effective from April

13th, was incorporated in the Edition 32 halfmil, published in mid-March.

At Luton, two new CTAs have been added on the north west edge of the existing area. One has a base at 3,500 feet, the other at 4,500 feet. The changes will permit a northerly approach to the easterly runway at London Luton for aircraft arriving via the LOREL terminal hold and avoid having arriving and departing aircraft sharing the same airspace south west of the airport.

The half mil will not be updated to incorporate the Luton changes until February 2007 at the earliest. The changes take effect from May 11th 2006.



## Robinson record

The Robinson Helicopter Company has officially become the top-selling civil helicopter manufacturer ever, with its 806 helicopters manufactured during 2005 topping the previous record, set by Bell in 1980, by 26 machines.
