

Designation as an Enterprise Zone makes the future even brighter for the former RNAS Daedalus, as Pat Malone reports

ee-on-Solent airfield, lately saved from destruction by the relentless efforts of the Lee Flying Association, has now been designated by the government as an Enterprise Zone, which makes it eligible for tax breaks designed to attract new business and encourage growth.

The designation was met with delight by aviators at Lee and is a cause for celebration for all pilots. New money will be invested in upgrading the airfield and its runways with a view to attracting businesses in the aviation, aerospace and marine fields. It is planned that between 38 and 45 businesses will move to the airfield, employing 650 people by 2015 and 3,500 by 2026.

Robert Hill, the AOPA rep at Lee, said: "This is fantastic news. A lot of people -Frank Thompson of Phoenix Aviation, the airfield flight training school, Peter Dalby, the B-N Airfield Manager who runs EGHF, and Jon Butts of Lee Flying Association have worked diligently on behalf of us all to achieve this great success for the future of the airfield.'

A great deal of work has been done behind the scenes. In order to ensure that money from the Regional Growth Fund (RGF) will be allocated to supporting the

upgrade will allow the runway to be licensed, and attract a long-term private sector partner.

The money also gives business support for SMEs already based at Lee or planning to move there, allowing them to expand their operations. The 'Daedalus Marine and Aviation SME Expansion Fund is expected to help up to 20 companies.

The designation means that companies will enjoy a 100 percent business rate discount worth over £275,000 over five years. They also get government help to simplify planning procedures in the Zone. The incentive for the local authority is that they get to keep the increased business rates resulting from expansion, rather than having to hand them over to central government.

The designation was welcomed from all sides. Gary Jeffries, the Solent LEP Director, said: "We put Daedalus forward for consideration as an Enterprise Zone knowing the enormous potential which could be unlocked. The announcement that the Enterprise Zone benefits will now be combined with RGF investment brings the site one step closer to becoming the world-class

manufacturing centre we are aiming to create."

Gosport MP Caroline Dinenage added: "The new jobs created by this government funding will be a major benefit for the local community and I look forward to the Daedalus Enterprise Zone flourishing as a centre of aviation engineering and marine excellence in its own right."

Jon Butts, Chairman of Lee Flying Association, says: "We believe this is good news for the long term prospects of the airfield and aviation at Daedalus, given the need for investment in the aviation infrastructure including runway, and utilities and services. It is important for the lighter end of general aviation that it is fairly considered, represented and developed as the airfield moves forward. Your continued support of, and help with where possible, Lee Flying Association is invited."

Britten-Norman is responsible for the management of Lee on Solent under a two-year agreement. The airfield manager, Peter Dalby, managed Bembridge aerodrome from 2002 to 2010. The airfield was established in 1917 as a naval seaplane training school and came under RAF control the following year when the Royal Naval Air Service and Royal Flying Corps merged to form the RAF. It reverted to the Royal Navy in 1939, and was decommissioned in 1996 during another round of defence cuts. Plans to close it down have been fought off by a group comprising AOPA members Malcolm Barton, Mike Cross, Jon Butts, Frank Thompson, Steve Cockshott and many others, under the umbrella of the Lee Flying Association.
